Music for the Wedding

Music Guidelines

Music for the wedding should be planned jointly by the couple in consultation with the music staff. Keep in mind that the Sacrament of Marriage is a liturgical celebration. Therefore, one of the basic principles that should underlie your selection of music is whether the music is indeed liturgical. **Popular songs and secular music are not appropriate at any time during the sacramental rites**. (They may be appropriately performed at your wedding reception.) The function of liturgical music is ministerial. It should assist the assembled believers to express and share the faith that is within them and to nourish and strengthen their interior commitment of faith.

The Director of Music is entrusted with the responsibility of determining the suitability of musical selections within the context of the Roman Catholic wedding liturgy, and must approve all music and musicians chosen for the ceremony. The music director also bears the essential responsibility of ensuring proper performance and timing of the various musical portions of the wedding liturgy. **Please contact the music director as soon as possible to make arrangements at least three months before your wedding.**

Cantor

A cantor is required for all wedding liturgies and only experienced Saint Andrew cantors are permitted to serve in this capacity. This helps to avoid disappointment to the couple and their families since it ensures a desirable continuity with the church's regular worship life, and protects the parish's mission in terms of high quality liturgy. It also helps guarantee that the service will go smoothly because presider, cantor, organist and instrumentalists are accustomed to working with each other as well as with the specific acoustical demands of the liturgical space.

If you are unsure of who you would like to sing for your wedding, the Organist or Music Director can make recommendations to you.

Instrumentalists

Instrumentalists (trumpet, violin, flute, harp, trio, quartet, ect.) may be used upon approval of, and arrangement with, the music office. **Due to musical and liturgical requirements, only experienced**Saint Andrew instrumentalists may play for weddings at Saint Andrew. If individual instrumentalists are desired, the music staff will recommend musicians to you, but their services must be secured by you. Instrumental trios, quartets, or other ensembles are contracted independently of Saint Andrew Church, and each ensemble likewise sets its fees independently. Names and contact information for approved music ensemble contractors are available from the Director of Music.

Trios, quartets and other musical ensembles are contracted independently of Saint Andrew, and they are free to set their own fees accordingly. Please contact the music director for recommendations on hiring instrumentalists.

Music

1. Seating of Parents / Grandparents – Choose a particular piece of music for the seating of the parents, please choose one of the selections below.
2. Entrance of the Bridal Party - usually the music for this is soft and "meditative." Canon - Johann Pachelbel Jesu, Joy of Man's Desiring - J.S. Bach Arioso - J.S. Bach Air from Water Music - G.F. Handel
3. Entrance of the Bride - this is usually music that is grand and stately. Common choices are:
The <i>Gloria</i> will be sung during a full Mass. The setting is chosen by the musicians.
4. Responsorial Psalm - this comes after the first reading, and by tradition, is always sung. Please select one of the following: May the Lord bless us all the days of our lives (Psalm 128) – Owen Alstott The Lord is kind and merciful (Psalm 103) – M. Guimont I will praise your name forever, my king and my God (Psalm 145) – Caroll / Guimont
The <i>Gospel Acclamation</i> (Alleluia) is sung prior to the Gospel. The setting is chosen by the musicians.
5. Preparation of the Gifts - this is when the gifts of bread and wine are presented after the vows are made. Please select one: (<i>Leave blank if you are not having a Mass</i>) Love One Another - James ChepponisGod Who Created Hearts To Love - Traditional HymnLove Divine, All Loves Excelling - Traditional HymnLord of All Hopefulness - Traditional HymnGod in the Planning - Traditional Hymn

6. Communion - any Eucharistic hymn would be appropriate here. 7. Presentation to the Blessed Virgin Mary (optional)
